A Multi-Scalar Examination of the Emerging Geographies of Wind Energy

The demand of renewable energy has spurred the development of massive wind farms across rural America. In order to grasp these impacts, it is important to take a variety of approaches to understand the multiple spheres of life that are impacted.
