## Injurious AIS Policy and Procedure

#### Division review of candidate species

- Prioritization
  - Are other agencies/governmental bodies addressing?
  - Invasive risk in the State of Ohio
- Risk Assessment Procedure
  - Conditions (permit, petition, evidence/potential, collection)
  - Tiers:
    - USFWS listing under Lacey Act
    - ODW: High Risk under screening methodologies
    - 3<sup>rd</sup> party: High Risk under approved screening methodologies
  - Classification: High Risk, Low Risk, Uncertain Risk

### **AIS Committee**


# Stakeholder and peer participation was recognized as an important part of this process



### **IAIS Candidates - External Evals**

- Both are known to be able to survive and expand in temperate, freshwater habitats similar to those conditions found in Ohio
- Both have a tremendous capacity for population expansion and outcompeting native species.
- NZMS are found in the upper Great Lakes
   States and the west spread by anglers and boaters
- Marbled crayfish have the potential to spread through the aquaculture and hobby industries from Europe

### Conclusions

- Because of their potential for expansion and probable detrimental impact, we would label both of these species as High Risk
- We propose that both NZMS and Marmorkrebs be added to Ohio's Injurious AIS List with Chief's approval
- This will bring us in line with the other Great Lakes states and provinces
- Report and recommendation forthcoming
