Alumni Profile **Donald L. Burton, DVM** The True Meaning of a Volunteer

This edition's featured SNR alum is no stranger to community service. Receiving his Bachelor of Science in Zoology (1975), Masters of Science in Natural Resources (1979) and his Doctor of Veterinary Medicine (1980) from The Ohio State University, Don Burton has always had the Buckeye spirit. After finishing his veterinary degree, Don decided to stay in the Central Ohio community where he became a lifetime member of the OSU Alumni Association and began to give back to the same community that had supported him during his years of studies.

Don has always had a love for wild animals and a keen interest in wildlife conservation. Although he enjoyed the challenges of private practice, soon after graduation he realized that there was an urgent need for wildlife education and rehabilitation in the Central Ohio area. While continuing to work in private practice, Don began putting together a plan and coordinating other volunteers with similar concerns for local wildlife

In 1984, his plan came to fruition; Don founded The Ohio Wildlife Center (OWC), a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization dedicated to fostering an awareness and appreciation for native wildlife. From the very beginning, Don had tremendous support from volunteers and local community members. Eighteen years later, the organization is stronger than ever. The animals admitted to the center have been hit by cars, attacked by cats and dogs, displaced, poisoned or even shot. OWC is recognized as one of the largest wildlife rehabilitation organizations in the United States and is the only wildlife center in Central Ohio equipped with immediate and continual veterinary service. Volunteers are the heart of the organization.


More than 250 active volunteers provide clinic, hotline, education, homecare, and development support. OWC has admitted over 4,000 injured, orphaned or diseased

wild animals this year representing over 100 different species. The education department travels all across the state presenting more than 250 programs each year to schools, local community groups, businesses and other non-profit organizations. OWC also maintains a 24-hour hotline to respond to these situations and receives over 20,000 calls a year from concerned citizens regarding numerous wildlife situations. It is through the combined efforts of volunteers responding to the needs of already injured and displaced animals and educating the public on preventing such human/wildlife conflicts that OWC is able to make strides in wildlife conservation

enthusiasm to OWC. He serves as the Executive Director, has a great deal of organizational and fiduciary responsibilities. The position is solely voluntary. In any given month he donates 75 hours or more of his time and hundreds of dollars in supplies to help OWC keep its mission. He coordinates help from local volunteer veterinarians and has formed strong partnerships with conservation organizations across the country. Don also has a strong personal drive for continued education and training. When he is not instructing he is learning, eager to bring back new ideas and techniques to the organization. He presents numerous programs, workshops, seminars and lectures throughout the country and is even featured monthly on local television promoting humane biological solutions to human/wildlife con-

Don continues to bring new ideas and

His personal vision has become a catalyst for wildlife conservation in Central Ohio. Last year, Don was instrumental in OWC's acquisition of a 19.4-acre property for a future nature center in Powell, Ohio. For the first time in 18 years, OWC has been given the opportunity to provide onsite reconditioning caging and educational programs (currently animals are housed and treated in the clinic in the



This land, situated on the Twin Tributaries of the Scioto River provides unlimited potential for the organization to evolve to the next level. With Don's drive and commitment to both humans and wildlife in the community, it will be exciting to see how the next 18 years unfold.

When he finds time to "get away" from the daily concerns of his veterinary practice and OWC, Don enjoys photograph ing wildlife and bird watching. He is always looking forward to the next chance he gets to go and explore a new park or refuge with his wife, Susan and their two daughters, Stephanie and Kristen. He also manages to be actively involved in his church and numerous community groups in the Central Ohio area.

Don Burton has dedicated his life and his professional time to help people understand their impact on wildlife and the importance of urban (and suburban) conservation. His latest endeavor is the formation of Humane Wildlife Solutions (HWS), an off-shoot business for OWC roviding humane exclusionary and nonethal methods for dealing with "nuisance wildlife around private homes and businesses. Ultimately, he hopes to leave his corner of the world a better place than what he found it. So far he has succeeded! Here's to a SNR grad that has truly put their degree to work!
