The Columbus Zoo and Aquarium is located at 4850 Powell Rd, Powell, OH 43065. The zoo's goal is to "lead and inspire by connecting people and wildlife." It was founded in 1927, was a small zoo, and didn't have much publicity, even with the residents of Columbus for the longest time. This changed when Jack Hanna became the director of the zoo in 1978. He helped to build the zoo to the world class institution that it is today. The zoo has been levy supported since 1985. It is open year-round and has special events such as Wildlights, which has been around since 1985. The zoo has also added a waterpark, Zoombezi Bay. A golf course, Safari Golf, was also added. The Wilds, a multi thousand-acre conservation park in southeast Ohio, is also owned by The Columbus Zoo and Aquarium. The zoo is accredited by the Association of Zoos & Aquariums.


MY DUTIES ON THE JOB

- Maintained cleanliness of animal enclosures and prepared enrichment for animals
- Measured out exact weights of food and medicine for each individual animal
- Studied full time-keeper staff performing various types of animal training
- Observed and recorded group behavior information of gorillas
- Educated guests on the animals they were viewing

These duties were consistent each day. Interns were rotated between one of three locations in the department. The locations were the gorilla building, bonobo building, and okapi barn. Each location was a base for taking care of multiple species in the department. The species in the department were:


- African Leopard

Tyrion, The African Leopard



A way to spot the difference between them is that Tyrion's rosettes (dots) on his forehead make a "W" shape whereas Jaime's makes a checkmark shape.

Keeper Talk




