# **SENR Dinner**

The event, attended by 190 SENR students, alumni, faculty and staff, was held in the Agricultural Administration Building Auditorium. Master of Ceremonies, Kenton Garwood, led an enjoyable program, which included several undergraduate and graduate student presentations highlighting the educational and service programs of the School. Jerry Bigham recognized recently-retired professor Dr. Neil Andrew for his years of service to the School and its students.

The SENRAS, represented by President Leighland Arehart, also recognized students who had received scholarships or awards. The Lee Johnston Awards were given to Justin Walter and Amy Rether. Ed Meifert, father of Nikki Meifert who died in a car-bicycle collision on campus several years ago, shared wonderful memories of his daughter and introduced the Nikki



Meifert Memorial Fund. He thanked the Ohio Division of Wildlife (where Nikki had worked as an intern) for helping to establish and grow the fund with a generous contribution. Attendees were treated to a wonderful meal catered by City Barbeque while being entertained by the music of the Bluehounds, a bluegrass band that includes an SENR staff member.

The evening was topped off by keynote speaker, Dr. David Maehr\*, University of Kentucky and SENR alumnus, who presented "Restoration and Recolonization of Large Mammals in the East-

## **2008 Lee Johnston Award Recipients**

As a student of the then School of Natural Resources, Lee Johnston wasn't just involved, he was a leader. He participated in the Parks and Recreation Administration Association, the Wildlife Society, and the Agriculture and Natural Resources Council. By the time Lee graduated from Ohio State, he had left a positive influence with the College, the School, and its members. Lee passed away just months after his graduation in September of 1991, from injuries that he sustained in a motor vehicle accident.

In the wake of this tragedy, Lee's parents, Lance and Elaine, moved to establish an endowment fund to provide scholarships that are awarded to students in memory of their son.

Recipients of the Lee Johnston Scholarship Award have the outstanding character and exemplary leadership that Lee, himself, had shown. As such, recipients of this award are not merely chosen; they are recognized as leaders amongst their peers.

The 2008 Lee Johnston Award recipients were Justin Walters and Amy Rether. They were recognized at the School of Environment and Natural Resources (SENR) Spring Dinner and were given their awards at the College of Food, Agriculture, and Environmental Sciences Banquet.

Justin graduated spring quarter 2008 and is pursing a graduate degree in fisheries at Ball State University. He

was instrumental in putting together the first SENR Recognition Dinner, served the Wildlife Society as President, Vice President and Secretary. He also served as Secretary of the Forestry Forum and was active in restarting the Student Leadership forum.

Amy is a senior with a major in Parks, Recreation and Tourism Administration. She played a key role in restarting the Environmental Education and Parks Society. She was serving as the Vice President of the society when the President unexpectedly stepped down. Amy then assumed the duties of President and helped to revitalize the society.

### OSU Entomology Professor Earns President's Volunteer Service Award



Williams is a scientist at the university's Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center (OARDC) in Wooster, where he studies and develops better insect-management practices for Ohio small-fruit growers.
