
The Columbus and Franklin County Metro Parks

System is a public agency in Franklin County, Ohio and the surrounding counties that has over 20 Metro Parks that span over 28,000 acres of land with 230 miles of trails. The Metro Parks are free to enter and are open everyday!

The mission of the Metro Parks is to "conserve" open spaces, while providing places and opportunities that encourage people to discover and experience nature."

I attended a virtual career fair in the winter of 2021 that led to an interview with the Columbus and Franklin County Metro Parks. After two interviews and an extensive background check, I received an offer to work at Sharon Woods Metro Park. The process of applying, interviewing and being hired was easy to navigate.

Typical Duties of a Park Ranger

While no day is the same, there are some tasks that must be completed every day:

- Complete a daily ranger log
- Interact and assist visitors
- Help park stay clean and litter free
- Keep all staff informed of park activities through radio communication
- Respond to emergencies
- Enforce Metro Parks rules and regulations
- Open or close park

When you are on the job, the safety of visitors, coworkers and yourself are your top priority.

During every shift you are the face of the park! You are there to ensure that the mission of the Metro Parks is being carried out.

The many vehicles of the Metro Parks

Park rangers spend 75% of their time in the ranger pickup. The pickup has all basic tools you will need during a shift, but there are times you may need a different vehicle for a specific task. Here are just a few of the many vehicles you might use as a park ranger:

Golf Cart

Used to patrol Inniswoods, since it is too small to patrol with a pickup.
