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INTRODUCTION



JOB DUTIES

During this internship, my main duties included helping with summer camp and virtual programs for school groups. While working, I:

- Taught summer camp classes, where I led hikes, brought animals into the classroom, taught curriculums, and led age-appropriate activities
- Worked on the logistics of summer camp, including making class rosters, parent phone calls, and recruiting kids for the department's scholarship program
- Taught virtual programs for school groups and assisted with camera work

EXPERIENCE

While working, I mostly worked on the back-end of summer camp with the program coordinators and assistant coordinators. I did however, substitute for the summer camp instructors when needed, which helped me gain a lot of new teaching skills and classroom experiences. By August, I was able to be an instructor myself and teach my own full-week of summer camp. During this internship I was also able to work with animals I had never worked with before, getting valuable animal handling experience and reaffirming my desire to work with wildlife in the future.
