Course Information

Course description

This course will provide students with a scientific understanding of energy, energy choices, and their implications for sustaining Earth's living systems. In addition, the course will present different conceptual approaches to the on-going energy problem that confronts human society. Energy conservation, energy efficiency, and the transition to renewable and alternative energy sources will be discussed. An important goal for the course is to enable students to evaluate energy choices for a sustainable future.

Course goals and outcomes

Goals: Students understand the principles, theories, and methods of modern science, the relationship between science and technology, the implications of scientific discoveries and the potential of science and technology to address problems of the contemporary world. Expected Learning Outcomes:

- 1.Students understand the basic facts, principles, theories and methods of modern science.
- 2.Students understand key events in the development of science and recognize that science is an evolving body of knowledge.
- 3. Students describe the inter-dependence of scientific and technological developments.

4. Students recognize social and philosophical implications of scientific discoveries and understand the potential of science and technology to address problems of the contemporary world.

Mode of delivery

This course will be presented 100 % in person.

• The in person learning classes will take place every Tuesday and Thursday from 2:20pm-3:40pm in Mendenhall 191.

How this course works:

- The course is broken down into weekly Modules that are posted on Carmen. Each module on Carmen will contain the following:
 - o A description of the topics to be covered for each class and the instructor that will be leading the class (either Jacquet or Cox, or both).
 - o Readings due to be read before that class.
 - o Any other instructor notes or announcements that pertain to the module.

Additionally, six homework assignments will be assigned throughout the semester and 3 exams will be given. These will be listed in the Carmen Assignments page and will be linked to the Course Calendar on Carmen (see schedule below).

Assignment Information

Grades are based on exams, homework assignments and attendance.

Homework

There will be 6 homework assignments throughout the semester including a final class project. The nature of assignments will include a variety of formats including reading responses, video responses, worksheets, or other materials. Assignments will typically be assigned and submitted via the Carmen course site. Note, your lowest score of the first five assignments will be dropped. The sixth assignment (the "Final Project") cannot be dropped.

Exams

Exams will be primarily a combination of multiple choice and short answer/essay components. The first two exams will not be cumulative. However, the final exam will be cumulative in nature, but with a focus on the subject matter covered in the final third of the course. A "study guide" (a list of topics that may be on the exam) will be posted approximately 1 week before each exam.

Attendance and Participation

Attendance is required. The lectures are delivered to provide the opportunity for class discussion and questions. Your presence is what makes class enjoyable! The attendance is worth 50 points, to divided equally by the number of lectures or other attendance generating activities. Attendance will be taken each day. Students are allowed 2 "free" unexcused absences before attendance points are impacted.

<u>Office hours:</u> We are available to help you to learn, understand, and grow as individuals. If your question is something that you believe may be of interest to others in the class, please post to the "Ask the instructor" discussion board. Office hours are by appointment in person or digital via Carmen Zoom. You are encouraged to reach out to any of the TAs or instructors.

Make-up Work

Make-up for missed work may not be scheduled in the case of an unexcused absence (and in some cases, may not be rescheduled for logistical reasons). There are three situations that constitute an "excused absence" from class. They are: 1) students who participate in a documented University sanctioned event, 2) students who have a documented death in the family, and 3) students who have received documented medical attention for an illness. Students who will be participating in University sanctioned events should provide the instructor with a copy of the scheduled events and those classes that will be missed. This documentation should be on University letterhead, signed by the coach/supervisor, and given to the instructor within the first two weeks of the semester.

Late Assignment Policy

To receive full credit for assignments, work should be turned-in on time and in condition to be evaluated. Work with excessive deficiencies may be returned for resubmission and will be treated as if they are late. Late assignments may incur a deduction of 10% of the total point value for each 24-hour period (or portion) that they are late (including weekends). Inclass assignments missed because of an unexcused absence may not be made- up or repeated; an alternative written report assignment may be scheduled for those missed because of an excused absence.

Credit hour and work expectation
