COURSE OVERVIEW

The use of science and research to address natural resource problems and the development of a literature review for a thesis proposal. This is a completely asynchronous online course. All course content, including lecture presentations and assignments will all be delivered and/or completed using Carmen (https://carmen.osu.edu). The course is graded satisfactory/unsatisfactory (S/U). This course is asynchronous and self-paced to give students the ability to access and satisfy requirements within a flexible time frame. There will be five writing assignments for the course. There are no quizzes and no exams. To accommodate students, all writing assignments will be open for a period of weeks on Carmen and can be completed from anywhere. All course requirements must be completed during the semester of offering. No textbook is required. All course materials (e.g., journal articles, literature reviews) are free and are provided to students using Carmen.

Course description

This course will introduce new graduate students in the School of Environment and Natural Resources to graduate education and help students begin a successful graduate research program. As such, we will overview available university and school resources and requirements, as well as assist with the development of professional skills needed for thesis and research preparation. Each student, in consultation with their advisor, will develop a literature review that follows specific guidelines similar to a systematic review. This course is designed to facilitate this process through the completion of several assignments, but the impetus is on the student to develop the ideas that will become their MENR or MS thesis.

Course learning outcomes

By the end of this course, students should be able to successfully:

- Develop a detailed concept map for their MS or MENR research project.
- Draft extensive Search Criteria and References for their MS or MENR research project.
- Write a Literature Review of their MS or MENR research project.

HOW THIS COURSE WORKS

Mode of delivery: Everything for this course will be done using Carmen (https://carmen.osu.edu). This course is a **100% asynchronous** online course. There are no required sessions when students must be logged into Carmen at a scheduled time. There are no required Zoom sessions when students must be logged into Zoom at a scheduled time.

Communication: Dr. Lower will provide important information (e.g., due dates, assignment information, reading materials) to students using weekly **Carmen Announcements** (https://carmen.osu.edu). Students are expected to read these announcements on Carmen each week. Students can reach Dr. Lower by email at any time during the semester at Lower.30@osu.edu to ask questions, discuss concerns or set up a time to talk with Dr. Lower using Carmen Zoom.

Pace of online activities: This course is divided into **weekly modules**. Students are expected to keep pace with weekly deadlines but may schedule their efforts freely within a module's time frame.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a **2-credit-hour course**. According to <u>Ohio State policy</u>, students should expect around 2 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 4 hours of homework (reading, writing and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of (S) satisfactory.

Attendance and participation requirements: Because this is an online course, your attendance is based on your online activity and participation. You are expected to log into the course on Carmen every week to work in our class (e.g., read announcements, post discussions, download journal articles, submit assignments, complete peer reviews). If you have a situation that might cause you to miss an entire week of class, you should email Lower.30@osu.edu to discuss adjusted timelines.

We will meet once this semester in-person on Tuesday September 7 from 5:00-6:30PM in 245 Kottman Hall. Detailed information will be provided on Carmen.

Late assignments

Writing Assignments:

Assignments can be completed on Carmen within a flexible time frame of approximately 1-3 weeks. These can be completed at any time within the 1-3 week submission window. Submission after the due

date for assignments will result in a 20% deduction per day from the overall grade. The submission areas will automatically close after 5 days from the due date and will not reopen. Dr. Lower will excuse missed deadlines under extreme circumstances, such as long-term sickness or hospitalization, family emergency, extensive problems at work, death in the family. For comparison purposes, a satisfactory grade (S) for an assignment in this course is comparable to a grade of 80% B- or higher for a traditional graduate-level graded course (i.e., course where a student earns a grade of A through E).

DETAILS ABOUT COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

There are 6 total class assignments: (1) OSU Libraries, (2) Concept Map, (3) Search Criteria and List of Articles, (4) First Draft Literature Review, (5) Peer Reviews, and (6) Final Draft Literature Review. Details for each assignment are listed below. Each assignment should be completed by the student on their own or in collaboration with their academic advisor. We use Turn It In software (https://www.turnitin.com) to check all writing assignments for potential plagiarism. Plagiarized assignments will not be accepted and will result in a grade of 0%.

1. OSU Libraries

The purpose of this assignment is to help get you started finding literature related to your MENR or MS project. You will learn how to (i) develop a strategy to efficiently find different kinds of resources (e.g., journal articles, technical reports, books) for your research project; (ii) design good questions and searches to find materials such as journal articles and book chapters; (iii) get your hands on materials from OSU Libraries; (iv) use a concept map and search structure to find resources such as journal articles; (v) use different bibliographical software (e.g., zotero, EndNote, RefWorks) to organize resources, create and format bibliographies and build annotated bibliographies.

2. Concept Map

As part of this course, you will develop a concept map that outlines the core of your research area. We recognize that your concept map could change as you get farther into your literature review, but starting here is a good exercise for thinking about the work ahead of you – a solid concept map should guide your writing. For example, you may decide to detail out your research questions and how different key search words relate or not to those questions as well as to each other. For this class, you are required to **submit your concept map to Carmen** (https://carmen.osu.edu/), but focus on finding a format that works best for you. Examples include online software such as Visual Understanding Environment (http://vue.tufts.edu/), Microsoft Powerpoint, or simply pen and paper. Also, get creative and take care with your ideas – it's possible that your final product could be a figure in your thesis or other published work! Dr. Lower will provide several good examples of concept maps from previous students on Carmen.

3. Search Criteria and List of Articles

We will focus on literature and systematic reviews and you will be provided instructions on how to conduct a systematic review. Please read the articles on these topics provided on Carmen (https://carmen.osu.edu/). You are not required to do a full systematic review as part of this class

(but you are welcome to do so). However, you *are* required to submit (i) a list of key search terms that you will use to pull from the primary research literature, including any search terms that you will exclude from your search; (ii) information on the database(s) from which you expect to obtain that literature; (iii) complete list of journal articles obtained using those criteria.

The list of key search terms and database(s) as well as the total # of articles should be submitted as one Microsoft Word document to Carmen (https://carmen.osu.edu/). However, the articles you pull using your key search terms can be submitted in any format (e.g., .doc, .pdf. .xls) that works for your research. Dr. Lower will provide several good examples of search terms and article list from previous students on Carmen.

4. First Draft Literature Review

This assignment requires that you submit a <u>draft</u> of your literature review to Carmen (https://carmen.osu.edu/). Your review must cite <u>at least 30 articles</u> pulled from the primary literature during your search. The draft should be complete (full sentences and paragraphs, figures included, and formatted in a particular journal style) enough so that another colleague could reasonably provide you with feedback/guidance that will facilitate final writing of your review during this course. Note: When you submit this draft to Carmen (https://carmen.osu.edu/), you should also consider submitting the draft via email to your advisor – hopefully, you have already received feedback by this point, as part of this assignment is to get you collaborating with your advisor and developing those collaborative ideas. Also, an annotated bibliography is unacceptable unless you have obtained permission from your advisor to do so AND provided documentation of that permission to Dr. Lower prior to this due date. Dr. Lower will provide several good examples of literature reviews from previous students on Carmen.

5. Peer Reviews

You will have two weeks to complete peer reviews for two other students' manuscripts and submit both of your reviews to Carmen (https://carmen.osu.edu/). Please plan your time accordingly. Peer reviews are one of the most critical aspects of publishing that are aimed at ensuring only methodologically-rigorous and scientifically-appropriate articles are published in the primary literature. Additional instructions on conducting your peer-reviews will be provided on Carmen and via email.

6. Final Draft Literature Review

The bulk of this course provides you the time and structure in which to complete a literature review constructed around your problem statement outlined in your concept map. The literature review is a presentation of the body of knowledge relevant to your research problem. In this review, you recognize the contributions of important authors to that body of knowledge and present the theory(ies) that defines the research area and results of past studies that support (or not) this theory (or theories). Furthermore, you should describe gaps or deficiencies in the published literature and how the research you will undertake should help to correct these

problems.

For this course, we expect you to produce a Literature Review consisting of 7-10 pages, single-spaced, with at least 30 references from your search of the relevant literature. The final product will be developed in collaboration with your advisor and given to your advisor upon completion. You will submit a Final Draft Literature Review (i.e., .pdf file, .doc file) to Carmen (https://carmen.osu.edu/). We encourage you to find a published literature review (or even better, a systematic review) in your area of study (or similar) and use it as a guideline in developing your own review – even better if that published piece has identified methods that can be replicated.

This assignment is intended to be relevant and useful to your thesis, so we encourage you to work with your advisor to identify the most appropriate format and necessary content. That said, we expect your literature review to contain an introduction that identifies:

- a. The context (relevance) of your study to environmental and natural resource management;
- b. What is "known" in your area of research (convey the most important information in just a few sentences--use this section to establish the current state of knowledge and set the scene for the next section);
- c. What is "unknown" in your area of research (the gap in knowledge that you will address);
- d. Why it is important to address this lack of knowledge (frame the problem that you plan to address):
- e. Your research question(s) and/or hypotheses. This section should reflect what you aim to answer or accomplish with your research project.

This introduction will then be followed by separate sections of the literature review, typically broken into thematic areas. You can use the following heading structure (three levels if needed) when organizing your paper:

1st level heading: Bold face, centered

2nd level heading: Bold face, left-justified

3rd level heading: Italicized, left-justified, indented 1" followed by a period. Regular text follows like this sentence (regular font, no bold or italicizing) and continues until the next section is introduced.

Your literature review should also conclude with a "significance" section, where you will describe how your results/findings will contribute to environmental and natural resource management. Describe what should be possible to do (or do better) after you've done/published your work that was not possible before.
