Note: *This course requires two off-campus field trips and an off-campus team project. Students must make their own arrangements for transportation within the Greater Columbus area or in some cases across the State. Alternate field trip assignments may be provided due to Covid-19 issues.*

Course description

Catalog description: An examination of the law enforcement function in environment and natural resources and recreation management.

Course Description: This course is an introduction and examination of the law enforcement function in natural resources and recreation management. This course has served as a precursor for students planning to attend one of the partnership ranger academy programs or pursuing a career path related to natural resources law enforcement. This course will provide a foundation and exposure to the federal and state law enforcement curriculums and the natural resources law enforcement profession. Students continuing onto one of the partnership Ranger Academy programs can receive additional college credit. These credit hours may be used towards satisfying Natural Resources degree requirements with faculty advisor approval.

Ranger Training Programs: Historically, this course has closely aligned with the National Park Service Seasonal Law Enforcement Training Programs located across the country. Recent major revisions in these programs have impacted this relationship. A more in-depth discussion will take place about this during your class presentation during the 6th week of class. Certifications from programs such as these are required to work in a law enforcement capacity for many of the federal, state, and local agencies involved in natural resources and recreation management.

Course learning outcomes

By the end of this course, students should successfully be able to:

- Understand the role and function of natural resources law enforcement as applied on federal, state, and local jurisdictions.
- Understand the history, philosophy, and objectives of natural resources law enforcement.
- Understand and be able to apply basic laws, policies and regulations related to the protection of people and natural resources in recreation and natural resources management.
- Understand and hone critical thinking skills related to modern resources threats impacting parks and wild lands in the United States and the world.
- Be exposed to and understand various career pathways and training required of natural resources law enforcement professionals.
- Become competent in both writing and presentational skills related to natural resource threats, protection and related law enforcement issues through group and individual projects.

Mode of delivery: This course is classroom based with two in-person field trips or similar events.

Pace of online activities: PowerPoints will serve as the basis for class lectures and discussions. A general outline of activities is provided in the syllabus posted in the module section of the course CARMEN page. Students are expected to keep pace with deadlines.

Credit hours and work expectations: This is a **3-credit-hour course**. According to [Ohio State policy](#), students should expect around 3 hours per week of time spent on direct instruction (instructor content and Carmen activities, for example) in addition to 6 hours of homework (reading and assignment preparation, for example) to receive a grade of (C) average.

Attendance and participation requirements: Course attendance is expected. Therefore, students are responsible for knowing any changes to the syllabus, for all information presented and discussed in class, for announcements made in class, for materials distributed in class, and classroom exercises & assignments. Emergency absences will be dealt with on an individual case basis.

Assignments

Midterm Exam: Take Home Exam, 10 short answer/essay questions, students will have one week to complete the midterm. Students will upload the assignment to Carmen. This is an open book/open note exam. This is not a group project. Students are to complete their own work as expected.

Final Exam: This will be an online exam administered during the scheduled exam time during finals week. Students will have 105 minutes to complete the exam. The exam will be True/False and multiple-choice questions. There will be 100 questions on the exam.

Resource Threat Assessment Exercise/Team Presentations: The class will be divided into individual teams of 5 students and a team leader will be appointed by the group. Each team will be assigned to visit a specific park site or natural area where resources may be threatened or endangered. The mission of your team is to identify and assess potential threats to the park resources. Visitor threats may also be assessed, but primary focus should be given towards resource protection. Each team will be provided 20 minutes to lead the class through a discussion of the resource threats identified. This will be part of the Modern Resource Threats topic to be conducted by your instructors during the 6th week of the semester. Covid-19 protocols will be observed.

Field Trips: Students will participate in two off campus evening field trips to designated facilities for two Wednesday class sessions. The locations and details for these evening field trips will be outlined during the course. Students will arrange their own transportation. Travel costs will be borne by the student. An alternate Zoom interview assignment may be provided due to Covid-19 issues for students. A written report would be required for this activity.

Term Paper Assignment: Each student will prepare and submit a research paper on a current and significant resource protection issue. Students will be given a range of topics to choose from that have been pre-selected by their instructors. Student term papers may be posted to the web to promote and advance greater awareness and education related to natural resources law enforcement. Additional details for the term paper assignment will be outlined during the course.

PowerPoint Presentation: In conjunction with the term paper assignment, each student will create and present a PowerPoint presentation providing highlights from their term paper research assignment. Students should be creative and thorough in the development of their presentation and should be prepared to make a 20-minute individual presentation on their research topic. Student PowerPoint presentations may be posted to the web to promote and advance greater awareness and education related to resources protection and enforcement. Additional details for the PowerPoint presentation assignment will be outlined during the course.

Practical/In-class exercises: Student attendance and participation in the course is expected during regularly scheduled class time. In-class assignments and discussions will be conducted during these class periods, and students are expected to participate. 10% of the course grade is set aside for participation in these course activities. Students should contact instructors by email or phone if they have reasonable conflicts and miss regular class time and may need reasonable accommodation.

- **Backing up your work:** Consider composing your academic posts in a word processor, where you can save your work, and then copying into the Carmen discussion.
